

IOWA SCHOLARSHIP FOR THE ARTS PROGRAM GUIDELINES

BACKGROUND

The Iowa Scholarship for the Arts supports the development of outstanding high school seniors who excel in the arts and are enrolled in accredited educational programs leading to careers in the arts. Scholarships in the amount of \$3,000 are awarded to support 2024-2025 academic year tuition expenses at Iowa colleges or universities.

TIMELINE

April 1, 2024 | Fiscal Year 2025 Application Deadline

The deadline to submit an online application is 11:59 p.m. on April 1, 2024.

April 24, 2024 | Finalist Applicant Interviews

The review panel will interview the top scoring applicants on or about April 24, 2024.

May 3, 2024 | Award Notification

Typically, applicants are notified of funding decisions within four weeks after the application deadline.

FUNDING

Scholarship award recipients are required to confirm enrollment at an Iowa college or university during the summer of 2024. Scholarship payments will be made directly to the Iowa college or university.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

To be eligible for a scholarship, applicants must meet the following criteria:

1. Current Iowa resident who will graduate from an Iowa high school during the 2023-2024 school year; and
2. Accepted as a full-time undergraduate student at a fully accredited Iowa college or university with a major in at least one of the following arts areas: animation, architecture, creative writing, dance, English, fashion, fine arts education, folk and traditional arts, graphic design, literature, media arts, music, theatre or visual arts.

Immediate family members or dependent children of IEDA board members, Iowa Arts Council board members or IEDA staff are not eligible.

APPLICATION REVIEW AND SCORING PROCESS

Eligibility Review

IEDA staff will review submitted applications for completion, eligibility and adherence to published guidelines. Applications are reviewed as submitted, provided that IEDA may contact applicants if any additional information is required. New or additional information or subsequent application information provided for clarification purposes submitted after a program deadline will not be considered unless requested by an IEDA program manager. Staff will also review an applicant's record of compliance and standing with the Iowa Arts Council, IEDA and State and Federal government, including but not limited to the Iowa Department of Revenue and the Iowa Finance Authority. IEDA will not move forward to panel review applications for applicants determined by IEDA staff to be ineligible or incomplete.

Determinations as to eligibility or completeness are final agency actions as defined in The Iowa Administrative Procedure Act, Iowa Code Chapter 17A.

Competitive Panel Review

Eligible applications will be reviewed by a panel of professionals with expertise related to the purpose of the scholarship program. This is a competitive program. Applications will be scored and ranked based on the published scoring rubric.

Interview of Finalist Candidates

Top scoring applicants will be invited to participate in a 15-minute interview with the review panel. The interviews will be held on or about April 24, 2024. Applicants must participate in the interview to be eligible for scholarship consideration.

Decision Notification

Recommendations are submitted to the IEDA Director for consideration and funding approval.

Applicants are typically notified of funding decisions, including decisions to decline to fund applications, within four weeks after the application deadline. Applicants are encouraged to refrain from contacting staff for application status updates during the funding decision process.

Online Application Submission

Applicants must submit applications via the Iowa Arts Council's SlideRoom, an online application portal. Applications will not be accepted in any other format. Late, incomplete or ineligible applications will not be accepted. Applicants can access the current online application requirements at iowaartscouncil.slideroom.com. Applicants must create a login to view the full application requirements for the program. Applicants can visit help.liaisonedu.com for assistance related to the online submission.

APPLICATION

Application Questions and Scoring Rubric

The Iowa Scholarship for the Arts scoring rubric will be used by the review panel to evaluate applications. The following application question is provided for reference only. Applicants must review and complete application requirements in the SlideRoom portal. Each component of the application has criteria and corresponding point values to ensure a fair review process. The rubric is on a scale of 35 points.

Essay

Describe your artistic vision for your work, the role your art form plays in your life, and what role you expect it to play in the future, including:

- What themes or concepts inspire your work.
- Why your art form is significant to you.
- What you value about being an artist.
- What you hope to gain from a post-secondary education in your art field.

Essay – Vision: 5 points possible

Letter of Recommendation

Applicants must include a letter of recommendation from a teacher or equivalent professional that specifically addresses the applicant’s artistic abilities relating to the intended field of study in college. The teacher or other professional will receive an email that includes a link to provide their feedback within a secure portal. Please be sure to check with your recommender to ensure they received the email to submit their recommendation.

Letters from IEDA staff or from members of the applicant’s family do not qualify as letters of recommendation.

Letter of Recommendation: 5 points possible

Work Samples

Submit 3-5 artistic work samples that best represent the quality and type of artwork the applicant creates. Artistic work samples should demonstrate the type of artwork the applicant intends to study in college. Review the work sample guidelines below to find the appropriate types of work samples that

should be submitted by discipline. Reviewers will not be required to view more than five pages of a PDF document or more than three minutes of a video or audio sample.

Work Samples – Technical Quality: 5 points possible

Overall Application

The panel will score the application overall on how well the applicant makes their case to be awarded a scholarship.

Work Sample Guidelines

Appropriate types of artistic work samples are listed by discipline below.

Literary Arts

Examples: Poetry, fiction, non-fiction, playwriting

Submit documents demonstrating the applicant’s literary artwork. Each document submitted may not exceed five pages. The pages of the documents should be clear and clean. Enter the title, year the work was created, description of concept behind the piece and any other relevant context for each item submitted.

Performing/Media Arts

Examples: Music, film, theatre, dance, performance art, music composition

Submit video or audio files demonstrating the applicant’s performance and/or media artwork. Video or audio files should be high quality, clearly identify the applicant’s participation in the work and may not exceed three minutes. Enter the title, year the work was created, description of concept behind the piece and any other relevant context for each item submitted.

Visual Arts

Examples: Drawing, painting, mixed media, sculpture, photography, installation

Submit digital images or video files demonstrating the applicant’s visual artwork. Each image or video

should be of high quality and clearly depict the artwork. Each video submitted may not exceed three minutes. Crop out unnecessary frames and make sure the camera is at the same angle as the artwork to eliminate awkward angles and perspectives in images. Enter the title, year the work was created, description of concept behind the piece and any other relevant context for each item submitted.

INTERVIEW

Interview Questions and Scoring Rubric

The Iowa Scholarship for the Arts scoring rubric will be used by the review panel to evaluate the interviews. The following questions are provided for reference only. Each component of the interview has criteria and corresponding point values to ensure a fair review process. The rubric is on a scale of 10 points.

Artistic Ability & Vision

- When and/or how did you become interested in your art form?
- Who or what has had the most influence on you artistically?
- What do you consider to be your greatest artistic achievement?
- What do you find most rewarding about creating art?

Interview – Ability and Vision: 5 points possible

Future Goals and Objectives

- Briefly discuss the reasons you decided to pursue an undergraduate degree in the arts.
- Name one short term and one long term goal or objective you have relating to your undergraduate education in the arts.
- What are your future career plans? How do you see your undergraduate education helping you attain those goals?

Interview – Future Goals and Objectives: 5 points possible
